Public Meeting - Future Housing Need

The 2007 parish survey highlighted a need for more affordable housing in Bourn for local people. A subsequent housing needs survey identified an immediate need for 10 new homes. Bourn parish council has accepted the results of the survey; for the past two years it has worked with District Council Housing and Planning departments to find a suitable and sustainable site for new homes. The options already explored are detailed in a report on Affordable Housing on the Bourn website www.Bourn.org.uk.

The parish council is keen that any new housing in the village should be appropriately located; within walking distance of local amenities (particularly the school, shop, surgery and public transport) and close to playground facilities).

A public meeting will be held in the village hall in February during which councillors will review the sites considered and present proposals for consideration.

Residents are urged to take this opportunity to consider the options and contribute their ideas and opinions to the debate.

- If your information is non urgent and will wait call your local NW coordinator

If in doubt call 999 and let the operator assess the urgency.

Traffic Speed Surveys

Many residents have noticed "Speed Watch" volunteers monitoring traffic through the village. Speeding traffic was identified as the most pressing concern in the 2007 parish survey.

The trained volunteers have gathered valuable data since starting regular traffic speed checks last spring. However the "Speedwatch" project has been temporarily suspended due to lack of volunteers. A surprising number of cars pass through the village at peak times; 340 vehicles in a single direction between 7.45 and 8.30am on a weekday (passing the surgery, travelling towards the village). Around 100 vehicles/day access Bourn Hall Clinic, the largest employer in the village.

On average, whether in the 30mph or 40mph zones, 20% of all vehicles exceed the speed limit, regardless of time of day or direction of travel. The greatest volume of speeding traffic was recorded travelling towards the village along High Street in early evening. Of those vehicles, the majority turned into Short Street. This could mean most speeding offenders live in the village rather than being "through traffic".

The registration numbers of vehicles exceeding the speed limit by more than 15% are passed to police and drivers receive a warning letter. The presence of the "Speedwatch" team in their yellow high-visibility jackets has the beneficial effect of slowing down traffic.
